Some of these projects include Meals on Wheels, Christmas float, Canada Day float, Christmas Wish for 25-30 families, annual ferry service to Kidston Island for tourists and locals, Club Christmas party, Pulling Classic and are always there to help the needy.

Robot Trail

"North of Smokey" you'll find the Robot Trail Lions Club. The club has 24

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very active members who meet once a month at the Buchanan Memorial Hospital. Their main fundraisers continue to be Golf tournament, auction, Raffle draws and Christmas tree sales. They support Christmas families, Highland Manor, Brigadoon, Scholarships, Foster Parents Plan, Dog Guides, School breakfast program, etc. Great Club. I have a Zone meeting on June 1st. Also - they have donated 2500.00 to the North Highlands Elementary School for new playground equipment.

Glace Bay
Glace Bay has survived. There are 9 "active" members and 1 LCI Life member. They are very active in fundraising to support their community programs. They have donated to local Food bank, needy families and Salvation Army. They are renewing their eyeglass collection boxes and are co-sponsoring the Cape Breton Dog Guides Walk in Sydney.

New Waterford
New Waterford continues to struggle

with memberships. Small town with a dwindling population. However they continue to fundraise through their Bingo and raffles. I will be doing another Zone meeting on Thursday, the 26th and I will report further after the meeting. I am meeting the Glace Bay Club there that evening and we'll talk about memberships.

Sydney

Sydney Club continues to do well in the community with 17 members (reg), 1 LCI Life and 1 member at Large. Fundraising efforts include ticket sales through Rona, Tag Days at various locations and dinners. Our projects include Transition House, CBRM Hospital Foundation, Big Brothers and Sisters, CNIB, Adopt a Family. We also co-sponsor the Guide Dog Walk with the Glace Bay Lions. I also do the eyeglass collection, sorting, packaging and shipping.

Whycocomagh

Whycocomagh is another well known Lions Club in their area. The club

currently meets in the local high school on their regular meeting nights. They fundraise mainly through 50/50 tickets. Their projects include pledging \$5000.00 to Whycocomagh Education Centre Playground Fund and sponsored a camper to attend Camp Brigadoon @ \$1300.00 plus doing many "Hands On" projects in their community.



Zone 2 Report for 2017-18

Membership in the Zone 2 area has increased by a Total of 12.

During the past several months we have lost three long time members due to their passing, we continue to recruit new members.

On the fund raising aspect of this zone we continue to raise funds through bingo, pancake breakfast, card plays, raffles and other activities.. Stamps, hearing aids, Cpap machines, and eye glasses. Activities around the Antigonish Highland Games in conjunction with the Town of Antigonish.

On the service side of matters we continue to assist with eye glasses and medical assistance to those who need. We have helped with Peace posters, speakout, drug awareness for youth. On the adult side of things we assist with community needs, including support for building matters, with wheelchairs, the purchase of a fence for a Autism Awareness dog guide. The sponsorship of Cadets corps and the use of the cadets in assisting with Mayfest and highway cleanup Cadets also assist with Seniors bingo at the Antigonish Club.

Some visitations have been held but there are usually limits on this due to weather and conflicts with club activities.

In general this has been a productive year for Zone especially in membership where we have gone from 175 to 191 members.

Over the past two years 10,382 pounds of eye glass cases have been collected. The return now will be over \$0.06 per pound. Last year we collected 35,000 pairs of glasses. Total raised \$316.43 used \$172.98 in gas. Turned in \$143.45 (net after taking out expenses) from the sale of Used Eyeglass Collection boxes. Would like to propose changing the name from Sight Conservation to Recycle for Sight. **DG Rhonda** advised Lion Russell to give his proposal to Constitution and bylaws Chair Lion David Manning for consideration.

e. COOKBOOK/CATERING – Lion Catherine Gibson of Stellarton – The book is now complete and includes not only recipes, including desserts, and quantities of supplies needed for preparation and catering to small, medium and large groups but also cooking times and a guide on how to do the place settings. e. GMT Report - Lion Bill Bruhm GMT Report to NS Convention, Yarmouth, 28 April 2018

The focus of the work carried out this year has been on recruitment and retention. Since our Winter Cabinet Meeting we have worked with a number of zones to identify strategies and processes which will increase the success of our recruitment activities, while, at the same time, increasing the retention rates of our clubs. Using data provided by LCI and PDG Chris Lewis, Area Leader Eastern Canada, Global Membership Team, we have examined the reasons why people join Lions clubs and why Lions leave their clubs. Supporting District Governor Rhonda's goals, we have also examined how we can increase the number of female Lions and the importance of being more family friendly. Two salient points jumped out for us: the main reason that people give for not joining Lions is that they haven't been asked, and many Lions who choose to leave their clubs still have a favourable view of Lionism and indicate that they would consider rejoining in the future, if asked. Three three-hour workshops have been held in the District to date: Eastern Passage-Cow Bay, Bridgewater and Deep Brook-Waldec.

Twenty-two clubs were represented at these workshops, with over 68 participants and observers. Attendees were provided with strategies and processes, as well as material provided freely by LCI which support recruitment and retention in their individual clubs. A fourth workshop will be held in for Zones 3A and 3B once we can identify a date. Budget permitting, workshops will be offered to Zones 1, 2, 4 and 8 in the fall. At this time I would like to thank the members of the Global Membership Team: Lions Wayne Sears, Steve Butler, Veronica Webb, Roger Carver and 1st VDG Perry Oliver.

Please Note the following: The District chair advisor do not receive any of the Leo Club reports, according to Lions Clubs International the sponsoring Lions Club Leo Club adviser and the Leo President is responsible for seeing that the Leo Club Officers membership list and member applications are turned in to the sponsoring Lions Club and sponsoring Lions Clubs secretary sends out those reports to LCI youth programs and a copy is held on file by the sponsoring Lions Club. The Leo MMR, a membership reporting Web site, allows club officers to enter and track data about club members they goes to www.Leommr@lions.org and click "submit Reports "to access the site. The sponsoring Lions club advisor and it`s Lions Clubs Leo committee and the Leo club Officers is required to follow the Youth programs standard Leo Club Constitution and Bylaws, the District Chair Lions Advisor is required to help the sponsoring Lions Club adviser, but when everything have been approved by LCI Youth Programs and the Leo Club have been Chartered, the sponsoring Lions Club becomes responsible for their Leo`s Club. I am hoping to see Bridgewater Lions Club and Truro Lions Club charter their Leo Club 2019.
